

**PUPIL PREMIUM - INCOME/EXPENDITURE BREAKDOWN Spring 2019**

**Context of Pupil Premium Children at Cardinal Newman Catholic Primary:**

In Spring 2019, 21 pupils were identified as Pupil Premium at Cardinal Newman - this is 5%, numbers are steadily increasing. 14 are currently eligible for Free School Meals. 5 out of 21 PP children also have SEND. Attendance of PP pupils is currently 90.7% this is below the school average and lower than the previous term due to longer periods of illness of some of our PP pupils. Attendance is monitored closely to ensure improvement for each individual child.

HLTA /LSA support Total -14 hours per week	£ 2856	Weekly sessions for individual Pupil Premium children to work on specific targets intended to close the gap or extend thinking e.g. 1 child is supported in class and in booster session before school with mental arithmetic strategies, 4 pupils in year 5 maths group have been helped with targeted maths intervention. This term support has largely been given in class so children apply their learning directly to class work. One year 6 child is being supported with homework in school hours.
HLTA lunchtime club 1.5 hours per week	£306.00	Lunch time club supports friendships and allows pupils to play in a quieter space. Computer Club is available twice weekly to provide support with homework tasks e.g. research projects and collective worship. 1 PP child has attended a small group singing club as a helper once per week.

<b>Home-School Link Worker support</b> 1.5 days per week	£3,900	Positive relationships developed with specific children and their families to enable the children to succeed in school. This increased parental engagement including attendance at Parents Evenings and school events to create a sustainable impact for families.
<b>ELSA MAT support</b>	£150	2 MAT supervision sessions per term
<b>ELSA Support</b>	£306.00	Emotional support to enable children to perform as well as they can in school.

<b>School trips support</b>	£285.00	<p>Financial support enabled all PP children to access opportunities which they may not have been able to access otherwise. Trips supported during this term have included Hooke Court and the Wildlife Centre.</p> <p>All PP children received vouchers to put towards a trip or club and some were supported further as required (e.g. with residential trip costs).</p> <p>Termly vouchers were also used to support with The Hooke Court trip.</p>
<b>School clubs support</b>	£356	<p>Financial support in the form of vouchers or other support has been offered to all PP pupils to encourage them to attend clubs. This includes support for 2 PP pupils to attend wraparound care. Vouchers were also used to enable PP pupils to attend netball and football clubs</p>

**Summary:**

Breakdown of data shows Pupil Premium pupils are achieving well with a significant number achieving better than expected. Progress in reading is good, but has slowed this term in maths and writing.

Access is free for Pupil Premium children in a teacher-led daily Homework Club to support their learning. Booster sessions for Pupil Premium pupils in Years 5 and 6 have seen some pupils making good progress. Additional Pupil Premium sessions are planned for Literacy and Maths in Summer 2019.
