



## Writing

Intent – At Cardinal Newman, we aim to develop every child’s ability to write effectively for a range of purposes. Children at Cardinal Newman will learn to confidently communicate their knowledge, ideas and emotions through their writing and reach their full potential. We believe that the ability to write fluently is key to success in later years and our writing curriculum aims to build vocabulary, spelling, sentence structures and application of grammar effectively.

### Implementation: In Writing at Cardinal Newman School we embed our intent in our pupils learning journey by:

- Use of Talk for Writing programme across the school
- High quality model texts are used as a focus for each unit to develop children’s understanding of different fiction and non-fiction styles of writing
- Children develop a writer’s toolkit linked to each writing purpose and audience
- Children learn to plan, draft and edit full pieces of writing
- Writing is taught 5x weekly
- Writing is linked to children’s reading development
- Children learn how to write effectively through shared writing and explicit teaching of the process of writing
- Spelling is taught daily using Read Write Inc: Spelling as a progression from Read Write Inc Phonics
- Support for low achieving writers is in place through a range of interventions including Clicker8, Word Shark, Literacy for All, and in-class support during writing lessons
- Writing lessons include a range of drama, speaking and listening activities with the belief that ‘If they can say it, they can write it’
- EYFS explore the basics of sentence structure enhanced through story telling
